The Nature of Theology

- Systematic Theology Definition: The comprehensive, holistic interpretation of Scripture for the purpose of intimately knowing and rightly worshiping God.

 Soteriology—Christology—Pneumatology—Ecclesiology—
 Israelology—Eschatology
