


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Introduction to Samuel

Title

- ✓ Hebrew = Shmuel (ב & ב "Samuel A & B"; "heard of God")
- ✓ Greek = Basileiōn A & B (ΒΑΣΙΛΕΙΩΝ Α & Β; "Kingdoms A & Β")
- ✓ Latin Vulgate = Liber Primus Regum & Liber Secundus Regum (First Book of Kings & Second Book of Kings)

Introduction to Samuel

WHO—Authorship

- ✓ Unknown, but not Samuel (his death is noted in chapter 25)
- ✓ Possibly King David and his royal court
- ✓ Ahilud, David's recorder

WHO—Audience

✓ The twelve tribes of Israel united as one kingdom

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Introduction to Samuel

WHEN

- ✓ Approximately 973 BC
- ✓ Toward the end of David's life where the book ends
- ✓ Dates of the Events—from the birth of Samuel (1110 BC) to the last words of David (973 BC); a total of approximately 140 years.

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Introduction to Samuel

WHERE

- ✓ Jerusalem
- ✓ 1 & 2 Samuel was probably written during a time when the kingdom of Israel had finally been established for King David.
- Though many of the events took place before David received the kingdom, the composition probably took place toward the end of David's life.
- ✓ Israel is living in a kingdom for the first time. The people are in the perfect position for a king to usher in the Kingdom of God, but their hearts are not ready.

Introduction to Samuel

To prove to Israel that not only do they need a king to deliver them from their enemies and teach them the ways of God, but they need The right king—one that will lead Israel in exclusive worship of Yahweh after His heart (1 Samuel 13:14; 14:8; 1 Kings 15:5; cf. 2 Kings 23:3, 25), and one that will love Yahweh with all his heart (Deuteronomy 6:5), of which David accomplished the former, but not the latter. Also, to confirm God's promise to Israel that He will one day bring this king to rule over Israel forever.

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Introduction to Samuel

HOW—Terminology and Themes

- ✓ King (or Kingdom, Kingship; 1 Sam 2:10; 8:5, 6, 7, 9 (2x), 10, 11 (2x), 16, 17, 19, 20, 22 (2x); 10:16, 8, 19, 24, 25; 11:12, 14, 15; 12:1 (2x), 2; ... 2 Sam 2:4, 7, 9, 10 (2x), 11; 3:3, 10, 17, 21 (2x), 23, 24, 28, 31, 32, etc.)
 ✓ Ask (or Asking, Requesting; Saul's name; 1 Sam 1:17 (2x), 20, 27 (2x), 28 (2x); 2:20 (2x); 8:10; 10:4, 22; 12:13, 17, 19; ... 2 Sam 2:1; 3:13; 5:19, 23; 21(2x)
- 8:10, etc.)
- Heart (I Sam 1:8, 13; 2:1, 35; 4:13, 20; 6:6 (2x); 7:3; 9:19, 20; 10:9, 26; 12:20, 24; 13:14; 14:7; 16:7; 17:28, 32; 21:12; 24:5; 25:25, 31, 36, 37; 27:1; 28:5; 2 Sam 6:16; 7:3, 21, 27; 13:20, 28, 33; 14:1; 15:6, 13; 17:10; 18:3, 14; 19:7, 14, 19; 24:10)

- ✓ The Forerunner to the King and Hope for a Leader (1 Sam 1:1 7:17) ✓ The Wrong King and His Failure (8:1 14:52)
- The Right King and His Success (1 Sam 15:1 2 Sam 8:18)
- The Right King and His Failure (9:1 20:26)
- ✓ The Fading of the King and Hope in the Davidic Covenant (21:1 24:25)
